“Cultures Art Are Subjects for Discussion”: The anthropology department scheduled two principal speakers on October 21. Robert Anderson will lead the first discussion on “The Position of Art in a Cultural Model.” The second speaker will be Warren L. d’Azevedo who will lead the discussion “Are the Gola Patrilineal?”

“Radio Program to Be Hosted by Paul Banham”: Music instructor Paul Banham is set to be a regular host on the “Symphony Symposium” radio program on KSL Radio that will precede a Utah Symphony Orchestra Concert. It is sponsored by both the Utah Symphony Guild, and the Salt Lake Junior League. This program was created so the music being played at the concert could be discussed.

says, "No Student is justified in blaming his cheating on the fact that 'everyone does it'". Dr. Wolff claims that this excuse will no longer work because now instructors are required to watch students the entire time, they are taking exams and copies of exams are being more closely watched. In a 1958 interview a student claimed that he cheated in order to level the playing field against obscure objective remarks. Penalties for cheating will follow a 3-offense policy that includes first offences receiving a zero and a one letter grade lowering, the second offence will receive an automatic failure in the course, and a third offence will get the student expelled from the from the class.
