“Donations to University Blood Drive End Today”: It was the last day to to donate blood to the Red Cross on Campus. The goal was to get about 450 pints of blood, according to drive chairmen, Linda Goodyear and Linda Petersen. Blood may have been donated if a donation was not previously donated within those past eight weeks.

“Olpin Cites Building Bond Faults at Press Confab”: The need for legal changes would allow a classroom bond at the University of Utah. The University could not do bonds and had to wait before constructing classrooms. The engineering building was getting construction done, followed by the new bookstore.

“Williams Will Lecture on ‘Politics in the ’60’s”: Associate professor of political science, Dr. J.D. Williams, taught a lecture about politics in that current year at the Union Little Theater. He graduated magna cum lauda from Stanford University, as well with a masters of art degree in public administration from Harvard University in 1949.
