“Amalemba Sites African, Kenya Political growth” by Elaine Krans: Musa Amalemba, minister of housing in the Kenyan Government spoke at the Union building and spoke on Kenyas political development. After WWII and having fought along side Europeans many Africans felt that they deserved the same political rights as whites. Despite Africas dark past, Amalemba stated that Kenya will have complete political independence in June of that year.

“New State of Israel to be Highlighted by University Travel Club Program”:The first event for the University Travel club was held that night at 8:15 in the Orson Spencer Hall Auditorium. Dr. Mulder, director of Center for Intercultural Studies, lead the discussion “A look at Israel.” The event started with the viewing of color film, “Side by Side” and was followed by a discussion about the new state of Israel and its developing society.

“Extreme Nationalism Gone, Says German Statesman”: Dr. Carl Christoph Schweitzer of the German Ministry of the Interior stated in a speech at the Orson Spencer Hall that “Extreme nationalism and militarism are a thing of the past in Germany.” He also stated the the majority of Germans would be willing to surrender to a United States of Europe. He said that Germans are in favor of a peaceful reunification of Germany regarding the Berlin situation so long as there were concessions by Russia and the West.

“Annual Homecoming Lecture Set”: Dr. J. D. Williams, associated professor of political science and Dr. William L. Fowler, assistant professor of music delivered the second annual homecoming lectures on Thursday in the Orson Spencer Hall. Dr. Fowler talked on subject “The Bricks of Music Builders” at 3 p.m. in room 211 and Dr. Williams talked about “The Fabric of Liberty” at 4 p.m. in room 216. Both men made impacts on the community and wanted a chance for people to see them in action.

“Civilian Travel Halted on Berlin Border”: On Tuesday, the U.S. Army quietly banned civilians from private trips to Communist East Berlin. The ban was not publicly announced but was quietly put into operation at the Friedrichstrasse checkpoint at 3 p.m. The ban was imposed to avoid a clash with the communists over western access rights to East Berlin.
