“Papooses Take Breather, Await Game With Kittens,” by Ernie Witucki: The University of Utah Freshman football team (Papooses) has a bye week after losing to the Utah State Freshman football team (Ramblers). The team will face BYU the following week. It will be the second time that these two teams will face off. The Papooses took down the Kittens in the last meeting between the two schools 18-14.

“Utah State Leads Nation Defensively”: The Utah State football team has held all their opponents to only 41.3 rushing yards per game. They also have only held teams to 116.1 yards of total offense per game, this is the best in the nation. Utah player Joe Borich is ranked sixth in the nation in total receptions with 24. BYU punter Bill Wright leads the nation in punting, averaging 42.8 yards per punt. Dave Hoppmann of Iowa State lead the nation in offense with 1268 yards on 249 carries. Jim Pilot of New Mexico State leads the nation in rushing yards with 845 yards on 133 carries.

“Two Game Set In Skyline Over Weekend”: Wyoming looks to maintain their position at the top of the Skyline conference heading into the next week of competition. Wyoming is set to take on New Mexico in a very important conference game. The other game in the conference will be Colorado State taking on BYU. BYU’s backfield has thinned out due to injuries with Paul Allen being listed as doubtful. Tall backs Eldon Fortie and Bill Wright are also listed as injured but Wright might be able to play in the game. Utah State will take on Western Michigan in that week’s competition.

The victory sets the Utes up for a key matchup against Utah State next weekend. The Buff were the first to score after receiving the opening kickoff and marching the ball 80-yards in 15 plays to go up 7-0 on the Utes. This story then jumps to page 4.

“Coed ‘Vampires’ to Stage Bloodletting on U Campus”: The University of Utah will work together with the Red Cross on Tuesday. The event is sponsored by the ROTC Sponsor Corps and the chairmen of the event are Deanne Simmons and Sally Anderson. There will be trophies awarded to the student organizations that donate the most amount of blood. The four categories

that groups can compete in are fraternal, service and religious, residence halls and military organizations. “World in Brief. Border Patrols Exchange Gas Grenades,” by The Associated Press: In Berlin, the border issue became more tense Saturday night through Sunday morning as both Communist and West Berlin patrol officers threw over 120 tear gas grenades. In Cape Canaveral, FL, the US planned to launch a monkey into space but the engine that was planning on being used had a leak in it. The delay for the launch will be a week. In Bonham, TX, “Mr. Speaker” Sam Rayburn rallied after being told he only had hours to live. In Moscow V. M. Molotov and two other supporters of Stalin are appealing the decision that got them expelled from the Communist party. It is believed that Khrushchev will allow the appeal to move through the proper channels before the decision is held up.

The theme of this year’s celebration is “The Magic Touch.” The purpose of the week is to make the campus more aware of the AWS and what they do for the school. Dean Virginia P. Frobos will speak on Thursday at the Union Little Theater about the theme of the week. The celebration will climax in a dance which will be held in the Union Ballroom on Friday night.

“U.S. Issues Warning to Soviet Union,” by The Associated Press: The US issued a statement to the Soviet Union that stated the US will fight for its right if the need arises. The US Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara released a statement that gives even more proof that the US will fight if the threat is necessary. He states that having both nuclear and non-nuclear weapons both here and across Europe is broadening the range of weapons at the US’s disposal.

“Montoya Plans U Concert”: Flamenco musician Carlos Montoya is set to perform tonight at Kingsbury Hall. He is the second performer in the University’s Artist Series. Montoya has appeared on many TV networks as well as performing all across the country. He comes to the U after performing at Utah State on Saturday. “Utah To Honor Indian Poet With Film, Talk”: Nobel poet Rabindranath Tagore is set to honored at Orson Spencer Hall Auditorium tonight. They will show a documentary on his life, there will be music as well as recitations of Tagore’s poems. Tagore founded the University of Shaniniketan.

“Ute Professor to Discuss Berlin Crisis”: The dinner club at the university will present Dr. Franz B. Schick who is a political scientist. His speech will take place in the Union Panorama room at 6:45pm. The title of the speech is ‘Berlin, Doorway to Death?’ and will talk about the Berlin crisis that is currently going on. Dr. Schick has taught at the University of California as well as the Free University of Berlin.

“Two-Stage Rocket Orbits; Boston Crash Injures 15” by The Associated Press: In Cape Canaveral two US satellites were sent into orbit by a single two stage rocket.
