“Dr. Angleman Named Ute Reynolds Lecturer”: Dr. Sidney W. Angleman, honored as the 26th Reynolds lecturer, will be giving his lecture on ‘Wandering Between Two Worlds’ on February 20th at Kingsbury Hall. Dr. Angleman was the University faculty, professor, and a dean of the lower division and associate dean of the College of Letters and Science. Due to his achievements as a researcher, he was selected as a speaker for the annual lecture.

“U Professors To Review Spotlight Art Exhibition”: As the second week of Spotlight on Brazil has approached, work of arts done by Brazilian modern artists displayed in the Union corridor are to be reviewed by two professors, Dr. Douglas V. Snow and Dr. Alvin L. Gittins. In remembrance of one of Brazil’s greatest artists, Candido Portinari, one composition showed a black ribbon for the death of Portinari on February 6th. Throughout the week, various films and slides will be played in the Union Little Theater including Heitor Alimonda’s performance at the Union Ballroom on Tuesday at 8 p.m. From artwork exhibition, films, to lecture, various events have been prepared to celebrate the Spotlight on Brazil week. “Snow To Reign As King In Carnival”: On this upcoming Friday and Saturday, the annual Snow Carnival event will take place in the Union Ballroom at 7:30 with a theme “The Rock and Roll Beat of Frantic Feet Crunching Snow”. A rock and roll dance will open the event which will lead with the Carnival itself. The admission fee is 50 cents per person and the Snow Carnival queen is to be crowned at the dance. “Third Man In Spy Exchange Comes Home”: Frederic Pryor became the third man in the spy exchange. He was able to come home after five months of staying in an East German prison. Francis Gary, U-2 pilot, also reunited with his family after he was exchanged for Rudolf Abel, the Soviet spy. The father of another student released from the Soviet, William Makinen, says that the release of Gary may signify potential friendly relations between the United States and Russia. Governor Rockefeller condemned the Kennedy administration for lack of safety

provision through air and naval support.

“U Crime Meet Begins Today”: Starting from February 12th, there will be a week-long Institute on the topic of crime, delinquency, and law enforcement at the Kingsbury Hall. Donal E. J. MacNamara, the dean of the New York Institute of Criminology, will be attending all 10 programs as the featured speaker. Programs will be divided into two lecture discussions which are going to be held at the Kingsbury Hall starting from 4:30. The first lecture is about “The Criminal Law and Morals. Is Crime Really Increasing?” and the second lecture is about “Minority Groups and Crime”. There will be many discussants coming to share their ideas on the topics including Dr. Arthur L. Beeley, the dean emeritus of the Graduate School of Social Work, Dr. Thomas F. O’Dea, professor of sociology, and Judge Ray Van Cott, 3rd Judicial District of Utah. The discussion topic on February 13th will be on “White Collar Crime” and “Feminine Delinquency and Criminality of Women”.

“Eyring Advises On World Of “Bullies”,” by Richard Rosenbaum: Dr. Henry Eyring, professor of chemistry and dean of the Graduate School, gave a speech about “Atoms and Missiles” addressing the Army ROTC Corps in Orson Spencer Hall Auditorium on Friday. Dr. Eyring said that U.S. being able to keep superiority in respect to bullies of the world will bring long-term democracy to those in communism. He argues that obtaining nuclear testing skills will act as a warning sign for other countries to not counter-attack. He says that we are already exposed to cosmic rays caused by nuclear testing.

““Friendship 7” Orbit Try Set For Wednesday,” by Associated Press: On Wednesday, John H. Glenn, Jr. is to be sent to the space making three times around the world. If everything goes as planned, he is to be sent off to the space at 7:30 a.m. (5:30 a.m. MST).
