Despite the large number of queens that were already present in campus activities, many Utes felt as though some aspects of campus life were not being represented. The original plan was to decrease the number of queens on campus, but many students and members of ASUU offered up their suggestions for how we could better represent campus life using the selected queens.

“Publication Council Tells ’62 Yearbook Editors”: The University of Utah Publication Council named the 1962-63 editor and business manager in this article. Jackie Back was named the Utonian Editor, and has journalism background having been the Chronicle news editor at one point in time. David Allen was named business manager having worked on the Utonian staff all that year, and having been the business manager of his high school yearbook.

“Regents Hike Student Fees” by Meg Rampton, Chronicle Editor-in- Chief: Tuition, housing, and academic fees all faced increases to keep the University of Utah a first-rate, high quality university. The ASUU Executive Council expressed their approval of this increase to President Olpin, under one condition. The ASUU demanded that excess funds as a result of this fee increase must be used towards the maintaining of campus health and academic standards at the university.

“2 Department Heads Gain Regent Okay”: The Board of Regents appointed two new department heads on its March 12 meeting. Professor Jay E. Welch was named the new director of the music department while Colonel Salvo Rizza was chosen to head the military science department. Welch obtained his music Ph. D from the University of Utah, and Colonel Rizza graduated from the military academy, West Point.

“Six Seniors Gardner Woodrow Wilson Grants”: Ralph Thompson, Douglas McKay, Suzanne Forsberg, Karen Elizabeth Rosenbaum, Judith Ralphs, and Carl Burton were six U of U seniors who received Woodrow Wilson Fellowships to help cover their first year of graduate school. Each fellowship covers the students’ entire first year of graduate school, with a \$1,500 living allowance. The six seniors were chosen from the 30 nominated in the graduating class, and the winners of the fellowship were chosen by fifteen regional committees from 9,975 candidates from 965 universities.

“Cwean Seeks Applications For Membership”: Cwean, a junior women’s honorary scholarship planned to hold its application tea on the following Wednesday. The tea is designed to inform and acquaint sophomore females interested in applying. Membership will be limited to 25 juniors, all with a GPA of at least 2.7.

“Deadline Nears For ASUU NSA Elections”: University of Utah students were asked to submit applications for ASUU and NSA candidates along with a \$2 filing fee. The ASUU candidates must fill 6 positions (President, 1st and 2nd Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Personnel Coordinator). The five chosen from the NSA candidates were meant to be elected to represent the university at the NSA Congress the following summer.

“Ute Travel Club Schedules Hawaii Film”: Travel expert, Thayer Soule, presented his travel film “Hawaii” at Kingsbury Hall. Admission for students was 50 cents.
