Bob Clark, candidate for first vice president advocated for separation of student press and Execs. Lynn Davidson, another candidate for first vice president urged publication of student government activity. Jim McBride, candidate for second vice president, advocated for better communication in student government to combat student apathy. Margo Taylor advocated for transparency between the school senate and students. Treasurer candidates Dave Jensen and Paul Keller advocated that special interest groups should disseminate info to students directly and the importance of giving out more jobs in student government to promote interest, respectively.

New York – Leo Cherne, Chairman of the International Rescue Committee, said Sunday his organization will not negotiate with the Cuban government to ransom Cuban war prisoners. Havana – Fidel Castro's regime has convicted 1,179 Cuban invaders of treason and offers them in return for individual ransoms of \$500,000. "Veep Calls Buidling List 'Essential' In Senate Talk," by Ernest Ford: Business Vice Pres. Paul Hodson deemed a \$31 million dollar construction program, submitted by the University to state legislature, as "essential." Hodson urged to ASUU Senators that departments are far too isolated between buildings, and the construction program could fix this problem. Dave Jensen, ASUU Senate chairman, introduced a list of proposed buildings and budget to the Senate April 4.

Jeff Circuit: I will support you fairly and see that we clear up problems in our government and its policies.

"The White Paper," by Dennis White: Do nuclear weapons make mankind less civilized? Most likely yes. Unfortunately, the solution to this problem is not as simple as disarmament. Dr. Lincoln P.
